Competing at the state meet for Ethan/Parkston were Evan Bartelt, Lindsey Roth, Kayleigh Royston (Ethan), and Riley Endres (Ethan). These runners qualified by placing in the top 20 at the region meet in Beresford.

On Friday, the state qualifiers and coaches went up to Huron to practice on the state course. On Saturday, they took a bus up to the state meet with the qualifiers and any other teammates who wanted to come and support the runners. The weather was perfect for running; there was a light breeze and it was an overall cool day.

The boys ran first with Endres placing 35th with a time of 18:09.59 and Bartelt placing 61st with a time of 18:41.64 out of a total of 129

runners. The girls ran about an hour later with Roth in

eighth place with a time of 19:39.00 and Royston finishing in 101st with a time of 22:54.76 out of a total of 124 runners. The top 25 earn a medal and a spot on the podium. The top 25 of all three classes receive the honor of "All-State." Roth was the only one of Ethan/Parkston's runners who accomplished this.

Football team finishes disappointing season

The Trojan football team had an up and down season. Parkston finished with a regular season record of 2-6 before losing in the first round of playoffs. They started off the year with three straight loses to ranked 9-man football teams. After losing to Wolsey-Wessington, Kimball/White Lake, and Bon Homme in fairly competitive games, the Trojans went on to defeat ACDC/TDA 45-6. Just when it looked like the Trojans were ready to put their past behind them, they lost in blowout fashion to Gregory, another powerhouse football team.

The following week Parkston lost a back and forth affair to Hanson in a heartbreaking loss that brought the Trojans to (1-5). With their backs against the wall the Trojans rattled off a 32-0 shutout win against Menno. This cold, frigid night seemed to be the turning point for Parkston. The following week would bring in Platte, which was also battling for playoff positioning. Platte would win the game 18-0 in an emotional game. At the end of this game the Parkston Trojan football team didn't know where it stood.

Parkston later found out they were heading to the playoffs. This senior-heavy team had one more chance to make a run. Their challenge, however, was the number one team in 9AA and our rival the Bon Homme

Cavaliers in an elimination game. The Trojans started the game with momentum, but it was never enough to match their opponent. The Trojans would drop the game 54-0 due to the 50-point rule.

Overall, this season can be marked down as a disappointment and lack of execution, but also a test to this team's toughness and resiliency. Coming into the year with first year head coach, Matt Grave, the team faced many challenges. Several key seniors were out with injuries that occurred early in the season and continued to nag on. Combine this with one of the toughest conferences in the state, and you have your hands full. One thing that can be said, though, was that this team fought until the end and gave themselves opportunities.

Stats: Parkston averaged 17.7 points per game this season. Rushing totaled to 1036. Passing totaled to 905. Rylan Leischner led the team with 10 touchdowns on the season. Leischner also led in interceptions with four on the season. Leischner, the powerhouse, also led in all-purpose yards with 958 yards. Nate Doering led the passing game with 840 yards. On the defensive side of the ball a 5'7" short whooping 165lb. nose guard Cole Van Zee led the team in tackles with 65 total tackles on the season. Van Zee also led the team in tackles for loss with 11.

STATE BOYS GOLF

In early October the Parkston boys golf team set to Vermillion for state. This year's state boys golf team consisted of senior Braden Bruening, sophomores Quinn Bormann and Matthew Ehler, freshman Kaleb Weber, and eighth-grader Payton Koehn.

The first round of State 'A' Boys Golf kicked off on Monday, October 7. In the first round, individual scores, Quinn Bormann tied for second with 78, Braden Bruening tied for ninth with a score of 84, Payton Koehn tied for 18th at 86, Matt Ehler tied for 50th with 96, and Kaleb Weber end-

ed the day with 100 and tied for 64th. After the first round concluded with Parkston in second place, only 14 strokes behind first place Vermillion.


